B.) PROFILE

Population

5,232 (estimated 2010 U.S. Census)

Location

The Town of Colesville is located in the northeastern part of Broome County, NY and is northeast of Binghamton. The north town line is the border of Chenango County and the Susquehanna River flows south through the town. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the town has a total area of 79.2 square miles, of which, 78.5 square miles is land and 0.7 square miles is water. Interstate 88, New York Route 7, 41 & 79 passes through the town.

Brief History

The Town of Colesville was established in 1821 from the Town of Windsor.

Governing Body Format

Home rule is strong in New York State and thus, each town and village has its own governing body. Towns are made up of a Town Board and Supervisor. Villages generally have a Mayor, Clerk, and Council. Along with town and village roads, any public water and sewer systems are operated by the local municipality, though they may cooperate with County departments. Each municipality has charge over its own planning and zoning and uses the County personnel as a resource.

Growth/Development Trends

The jurisdiction noted that there is no major residential/commercial development or major infrastructure development that has been identified for the next five (5) years in the municipality.

Broome County has a history of natural hazard events as detailed in Volume I, Section 5 of this plan. A summary of historical events is provided in each of the hazard profiles and includes a chronology of events affecting the County and its municipalities. The classifications listed above relate to the community's effectiveness in providing services that may impact it's vulnerability to the natural hazards identified. These classifications can be viewed as a gauge of the community's capabilities in all phases of emergency management (preparedness, response, recovery and mitigation) and are used as an underwriting parameter for determining the costs of various forms of insurance. The CRS class applies to flood insurance while the BCEGS and Public Protection classifications apply to standard property insurance. CRS classifications range on a scale of 1 to 10 with class one (1) being the best possible classification, and class 10 representing no classification benefit. Firewise classifications include a higher classification when the subject property is located beyond 1000 feet of a creditable fire hydrant and is within 5 road miles of a recognized Fire Station.

F. MITIGATION STRATEGY

F.1) Past Mitigation Actions/Status

The town has finalized the buyout of one flood-prone property on Riverview Place, and has completed a concrete retaining wall and culvert replacement in the Penny Hollow area. It has also implemented drainage improvements, built larger culvert pipes, and provided more public information.

The town noted that the local Planning Board considers the recommendations from the 2007 Hazard Mitigation Plan during its site plan review process.

The progress of mitigation actions from the 2007 Hazards Mitigation plan is indicated in Section F.3. Actions that are in not yet complete or are ongoing have been carried over to this plan update.

F.2) Hazard Vulnerabilities Identified

The town identified the Susquehanna River area as a hazard problem area where it has suffered damages/losses to natural hazards in the past. Specifically, heavy storm runoff and rapid snowmelt have negatively impacted this area.

It is estimated that in the Town of Colesville, 2131 residents live within the 1% annual chance flood area (NFIP Special Flood Hazard Area). Of the municipality's total land area, 2.9% is located within the 1% annual chance flood area. \$9,1247,303 (8.6%) of the municipality's general building stock replacement cost value (structure and contents) is located within the 1% annual chance flood area.

Further information regarding the community's participation in the NFIP is provided in the table below.

NFIP Summary

There are 55 NFIP policies in the community and there are 13 policies located within the 1% annual chance flood area. FEMA has identified 10 Repetitive Loss (RL) including 0 Severe Repetitive Loss (SRL) properties in the municipality.

HAZUS-MH estimates that for a 1% annual chance flood, \$41,448,400 (3.9%) of the municipality's general building stock replacement cost value (structure and contents) will be damaged, 347 people may be displaced, 159 people may seek short-term sheltering, and an estimated 3,565 tons of debris could be generated. HAZUS-MH estimates the following damage and loss of use to critical facilities in the community as a result of a 1% annual chance flood event:

Examples include planning and zoning, floodplain local laws, capital improvement programs, open space preservation, and storm water management regulations.
- 3. PE=Public Education and Awareness: Actions to inform and educate citizens, elected officials, and property owners about hazards and potential ways to mitigate them. Explanation of Priorities

High Priority = A project that meets multiple objectives (i.e., multiple hazards), benefits exceeds cost, has funding secured or is an on-going project and project meets eligibility requirements for the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) or Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant Program (PDM) programs. High priority projects can be completed in the short term (1 to 5 years).

Medium Priority = A project that meets goals and objectives, benefits exceeds costs, funding has not been secured but project is grant eligible under, HMGP, PDM or other grant programs. Project can be completed in the short term, once funding is completed. Medium priority projects will become high priority projects once funding is secured.

Low Priority = Any project that will mitigate the risk of a hazard, benefits do not exceed the costs or are difficult to quantify, funding has not been secured and project is not eligible for HMGP or PDM grant funding, and time line for completion is considered long term (1 to 10 years). Low priority projects may be eligible other sources of grant funding from other programs. A low priority project could become a high priority project once funding is secured as long as it could be completed in the short term.


