BROOME COUNTY CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

REENTRY REFORM ADVISORY GROUP

- First convened in December 2022
- Meets monthly to discuss Correctional Facility issues and improvements
- Consists of local healthcare, workforce and social service professionals, advocates and previously incarcerated individuals.

NEW ADMINISTRATOR AND SIGNIFICANT POLICY CHANGES

- Major Robert Charpinksy hired as Jail Administrator of the Broome County Correctional Facility.
- Major Charpinsky oversaw a comprehensive review and update of policies for Use of Force, De-escalation and Duty to Intervene.



CORRECTIONAL FACILITY STAFFING CRISIS

- Shortage of 38 open positions in January 2023
- Hired Director of Community Engagement and Recruitment, Charles Woody
- Recruited, Trained and Retained 31 new Corrections Officers

Hired the Largest and Most Diverse Class of New Corrections Officers in the History of the Broome County Sheriff's Office




EXPANDED VISITATION HOURS

- September 2023 47 hours available/week



EXPANSION OF SUPPORT AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS

- January 2023 Zero Correctional Facility Programming
- Restored and added over 30 hours of weekly programming and services available to incarcerated individuals.



EXPANSION OF SUPPORT AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Program partnerships include the Broome County Council of Churches, Mothers and Babies Perinatal Network, the Addiction Center of Broome County, Rise Domestic Violence Services, Cornell Cooperative Extension Broome County, Inside Out Network, League of Women Voters and more. Programs include, but are not limited to:

 The interfaith Jail Ministry Program, run by the Broome County Council of Churches provides opportunities for worship, counseling, education, and support for inmates. Offers services and support to ex-offenders returning to community from prison or jail. The program includes religious services for a variety of denominations, including non-denominational services, pastoral visits and interfaith one-on-one meetings.


NEW CORRECTIONAL FACILITY GARDEN



- Maintained by incarcerated "trustees" under supervision and direction of master gardeners from Cornell Cooperative Extension
- Over a dozen baskets of tomatoes, lettuce, peppers, zucchini and more donated to CHOW Food Pantry in 2023.

INTRODUCED NEW DIGITAL LEARNING INITIATIVE

- L.E.A.R.N. (Life Skills, Education and Accountability for Reentry Navigation) provides over 60 hours of education, self improvement and workforce development training on each inmate's tablet.
- Inmates have access to courses during daytimes hours and throughout the night,
- In the process of adding over 10,000 book titles in 2024 to be available on each tablet.



INTRODUCED NEW DIGITAL LEARNING INITIATIVE


Since November 2023, over 400 incarcerated individuals have completed over 4,800 individual training courses.



HOLDING MEDICAL, MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TREATMENT PROVIDERS ACCOUNTABLE

- Comprehensive Audit found over \$257,874 in overpayments and contracted service disparities.
- Provider agreed to meet the staffing and service requirements listed in the contract and repay the outstanding \$257,874 via credited deductions in its monthly invoices over a 12-month period in 2024.



ENSURING INMATES RECEIVE THE MEDICALLY ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT) THEY NEED



- Commissioned Audit of Medical Services to assess and analyze the needs of the inmate population, requirements of state regulations and compare them to services currently provided by contracted medical providers.
- Weekly medical treatment meetings with Command Staff and Medical, Mental Health and SUD treatment providers to review cases and resolve issues.
- Added a new Forensic Services Program Coordinator to examine workflows, barriers to treatment both during incarceration and at time of release, identifying highest needs and where resources must be allocated.


ENSURING INMATES RECEIVE THE MEDICALLY ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT) THEY NEED

- Any inmate entering the facility seeking MAT can receive it.
- After incarceration, inmates are reassessed to ensure those who initially refused treatment have another chance to enter the program.
- Provider is working to hire additional staff to perform regular assessments for inmates for changes to current prescription or late entry into the MAT program.
- Before every discharge, scheduled or not, all inmates are assessed and connected to the appropriate continuity of MAT care before leaving the facility.

IMPROVING FOOD QUALITY



- Worked to address longstanding issue of food quality provided at the Correctional Facility by renegotiating Broome County's contract with the Correctional Facility food service provider.
- New contract substantially improves the quality of food for both incarcerated individuals and corrections staff while remaining consistent with the NYS Commission on Corrections Nutritional Standards.

REFORMING THE INMATE REQUEST AND GRIEVANCE SYSTEM

- Three levels of oversight added to Inmate Requests and Grievances.
- Added new position of Grievance Supervisor.
- All requests are now reviewed by Receiving Officer, Supervisor and Command Staff to ensure accountability.



- Better access to hygiene products and clean underwear.
- Pull-up bar added to pods for fitness and recreation.

REFOCUSING ON SUCCESSFUL REENTRY NAVIGATION



- All discharged inmates provided with Sheriff IDs as needed to help with access to healthcare and social services.
- Hired a full time Discharge Planner whose sole responsibility is connecting each soonto-be released incarcerated individual with the services and support they need before they exit our facility so they can make a more successful transition as they reenter the community.

REFOCUSING ON SUCCESSFUL REENTRY NAVIGATION

- Forensic Services Program Coordinator performing comprehensive assessment on critical times and essential needs for discharged inmates.
- Assists Discharge Planner by coordinating with outside agencies to ensure access to housing, transportation and healthcare for formerly incarcerated upon release.
- Ensuring that unscheduled releases have access to food, clothes and other immediate needs.



CONTINUING TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS IN 2024

- Partnering with the Addiction Center of Broome County to assist with Substance Use Disorder treatment in the Correctional Facility.
- Expanding Partnership with Southern Tier AIDS Program, utilizing Opioid Settlement Funds to hire an additional Discharge Planner.
- Will begin tracking success and recidivism connected to Reentry Program in 2024.

CONTINUING TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS IN 2024

- Implementing a new Gang Intelligence Unit to monitor gang activity within the facility, share intelligence and coordinate with regional law enforcement partners.
- Adding Commissary Vending Machines to every housing unit.
- Completing a facility-wide security camera upgrade for increased safety and security for both the incarcerated and corrections staff.

CONTINUING TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS IN 2024



- Adding 50 new body cameras to Corrections division, effectively tripling the number of body cameras in use for increased transparency and accountability.
- Every SERT Team member will have a camera for when they just intervene in individual cells.
- Each camera will have a license to better track and ensure security of body camera footage.
